RETURN OF THE FEMME FATALE There Is A Shift In Involvement Of Women From Being A Forced Accomplice To The Brain Behind Major Crimes

nstances of women playing a major role in crimes are on the rise. There may not be statistics to substantiate this assumption, but Saritha S Nair or lesser known Kavita Pillai are not the only incidents of women becoming one of the main accused in crimes that have often jolted the society for either its innovative method or its brutality.

Though experts are not ready to term it as a new trend, investigating officials have started to look at the Eve's role in crimes. "If one were to look at the crime data, 2-3% of the criminals were women. In cases of girl trafficking, the operators definitely have been women," said ADGP B Sandhya.

There is no doubt that the types of crimes that are being committed by women have also become varied.

Take the case of the two women who were arrested in Kochi recently on charges of blackmailing NRIs using their nude pictures captured using hidden cameras. The presence of the male accomplice was secondary in this case.

"When women commit crimes, they plan it precisely, especially, if they have a personality problem, maniac or psychic," said Dr Shailaja Ramkumar, psychiatrist, Westfort Hospital, Thrissur. "Since the society has put several controls on women, when they break out of those restrictions, they operate in such a way that all loopholes are plugged. Very often such women have no regrets too," she said.

According to the psychiatrist the frontal lobo of the brain is strong in women. "That's why they are successful in multi-tasking. This is part of the brain that regulates decision making, problem solving, control of purposeful behaviours and emotions. Add to it a hormonal change during a pre-menstrual cycle and you have a killer com-

bination," she added. Most such women don't have any regrets about what they had done, Dr Shailaja said. "Given a chance, they would go out and commit the crime again.'

"The women who commit crimes have a personality trait. It must be that they have seen or been part of a crime in past, or victims out on vengeance," said Celine Sunny, research head of women study centre, Rajagiri College of Social Sciences. "Suppressed criminal tendency come out when they start thinking of committing a crime. They will also not be scared. Men commit crimes on impulse. Women plan it well and successfully commit it," she said.

Meanwhile, criminologist James Vadakumchery said internet had increased the nature of crimes involving women. "Women are good at soft skills. So in the internet era, they do very well. Initially, when police dogs were not part of the investigation, women were never caught, because nobody suspected them. Even now, the first suspect is always the male and the investigators first looks at the male involvement," he said. He added that even if the man played the active

Children are not safe here

Kochi: The state is ranked ninth in the country when it comes to crime against children. According to the data published by national crime records bureau (NCRB), on an average five cases of crime against children were reported daily in the state during 2013. As many as 637 cases of child rape were reported in the state

in 2013, against 455 cases in 2012. The state registered 41% in the crimes against children as such cases went up from 1,324 in 2012 to 1,877 in 2013. When it comes to the crimes against children, Thiruvananthapuram topped with 90 cases and followed by Kozhikode (73), Kollam (72), Kochi (71), Thrissur (49) and Malappuram (25).

"This is either because of the increase in reporting of such cases or police have to register cases in all the child abuse cases under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, said Meena Kuruvila, member, State Child Rights Commission. "Such cases can be prevented by making elders as well as children aware of the Act," she said.

Kollam topped the list in the number of child rape cases in the state with 58 cases, followed by Thiruvananthapuram (38), Kochi (22), Thrissur (16) Kozhikode (12) and Malappuram (9). The state also witnessed murder of 40 persons aged below 18 years in 2013 against 34 such cases the previous year.

According to the data, 2,627 cases related to crime against children, including those from the previous year, were under investigation during 2013. During probe the police found that in 18 cases the charges were false or mistaken. While final reports were filed in 39 cases, charge sheets were submitted in 1,421 cases of crime against children last year. At the end of the year, investigation was pending in 1.147 cases

CRIME RATE IN STATE IS THE HIGHE

Thiruvananthapuram: There used to be a time when the state made headlines for the achievements in social development that were comparable to that of many developed countries, despite having a low per capita income. However, in recent times, the state has achieved notoriety with its growing crime rate.

As per the latest statistics published by national crime records bureau, Kerala is the third biggest contributor of the total crimes registered in the country last year. The state contributes 10.2% of total crimes recorded, falling behind only to Uttar Pradesh (48%) and Tamil Nadu (12.4%).

Though compared to the other two states, the contribution of Kerala is very low, what can be a worry to the law enforcers here is the state's crime rate. The crime rate of the state is 1158.7. This means for every one lakh people, roughly around 1,159 criminal cases are reported. This puts the state with the highest crime rate in the country.



Though Uttar Pradesh and Tamil Nadu recorded more number of crimes, the crime rates there are low as their population is high. The crime rate in UP and Tamil Nadu for the year 2013 is 917.5 and 720.9 respectively.

But, state police chief KS Balasubramanian said that it was unfair to compare the situation in the state with that of UP and Tamil Nadu using these figures. "Even the smallest cases get recorded and an FIR is filed in the state. The situation is different in other states." he said.

"Even last week, I was having a discussion with the officials who are involved in implementation of crime and criminal tracking network systems. They said in most other states, FIRs are not registered in cases of unnatural deaths and suicides and hence they did not get included in the crime and criminal tracking network & systems data. But I do not support this and asked our officers to include the data of every small case in the network system," Balasubramanian said.

A detailed look into the crime figures of the state shows that Kollam is the most dangerous district in the state, with a total number of 64 rapes and 16 murders.

The DGP said that majority of the rape cases reported in the state are characteristically different from those reported in north Indian states. Most rapes reported here are actually sexually exploitations over fake promises of marriages, which later turn into rape cases. "Having said so, there is an alarming rise in the number rape cases of late. At least 50% of the rape cases reported these days are committed by close rela tives or someone within the family, such as uncle, brother, stepfather and even father. It is a case that has to be taken up by social scientists," the DGP said.

etting to like the film 'Vegam' is like stepping into marriage. There is a flurry of forewarnings about the hidden dangers, about the yawn-filled routines involved in marriage, still people get married failing to resist the rare charms marriage holds for them. Once such gems are discovered, the flaws are ignored and the banality is borne with the patience of a saint.



Vegam comes across a low-key film with a hero, who is vet to build an identity, with a supporting cast who do not flourish a dazzling acting prowess. It brings together money, virtues, desperation of youth and spontaneous decisions which turn the course of life. Not something new, especially when the money gets packed in a bag and helpless youth find themselves scrambling after the bag. The showcase pieces of villains with huge tummies. twirled moustaches play together.

It is hard to write off Vegam as a brainless repetition of clichés for it does engage the viewer. However it happens not with a gripping consistency but certainly like the occasional, surprise breeze that brushes past our faces on a sultry day at the beach. Vineeth Kumar and Gregory gel together to play the trapped youth dreaming of richness with a vigour that is sometimes really absorbing.

Director Anilkumar works within his limits often affording a few scenes that fall way too short of professional filmmaking. Still he manages to grab the attention with a story that is pretty decently told. Vegam may not make for a blockbuster thriller, however it won't leave you hopelessly disappointed, if you really nurture a heart for films. – Aswin J Kumar

His mother consoles him by leading him on to believe that he is 'sundar' (goodlooking). She also tells him that one day he'll marry a pretty 'memsaab' (by pointing to a poster of Rani Mukerji).

However, the very next minute, she explains her interpretation of 'memsaab' by showing her son another *gori* mem (tourist) passing by. "Someone like her," she says. He says, "Main aisi hi memsaab se saadi karunga."

Munna grows up but continues to nurture his dream of getting married to a gori mem, just to make his mother happy. He leaves his village and lands up in a city to fulfil his dream. With great audacity, he proposes marriage to random urban women but his requests get turned down. However, there is light at the end of every tunnel. He eventually bumps into a Katrina

Kaif-like firang memsaab. Do they fall in love?

Ample Hindi films with a similar concept have been made before and they were much better if not remarkable. For instance, Govinda-Aishwarya Rai starrer Albela (2001) was a lighthearted romcom that made us smile. While the intentions are noble here.

tacky execution spoils everything. Forced humour fails to amuse and funny sounds used as background score do not compensate for the poor script. The point that the director intends to make does not come across either. His attempt at exposing the shallowness of our society that prefers 'good-looking' people fails to register. Also, performances are forgettable.

The gori mem is the best actor here! Songs have no relevance to
